MONSTER TALES

- 1. Have your child make a mask out of newspaper. Then have him/her decorate the mask with things like markers, crayons, buttons, feathers, or glitter. Invite your child to parade around the house with his/her mask. "Let the wild rumpus begin."
- 2. Talk to your child about his/her bedtime fears. Give your child different ways to deal with his/her fears (i.e., a nightlight, a flashlight, a special stuffed toy).
- 3. After reading one of the books from the unit to your child, talk about a time he/she was afraid.
- 4. Ask your child what he/she likes most about bedtime and what he/she does not like about bedtime.
- 5. After reading several books from the unit to your child, ask your child which book he/she thought was scary. Why was it scary?
- 6. Ask your child to draw a scary picture. Then ask him/her to tell you what the scariest part of the story is.
- 7. Ask your child about his/her fears. What kinds of things are frightening to him/her? Explain that everyone is afraid sometimes.
- 8. After reading a book from the unit, ask your child what suggestions they would have for the main character in the story.
- 9. Together with your child draw a monster. You can start by drawing a funny shaped body. Have your child add a head. Take turns with the face and limbs. By making the monster you can help your child conquer his/her fears.
- 10. Make an apple or potato monster. You supply an apple or a potato. Then with toothpicks or small twigs use odds and ends such as buttons, string, scraps of material, etc. Have your child make a head, face and limbs. When finished remove all the inedible pieces and enjoy the apple or potato with your child.
- 11. Talk to your child about a time when you were scared. Then ask your child about a time that they were scared.
- 12. Talk with your child about a time when you were brave and then ask them to tell you about a time they were brave.

- 13. Ask your child to draw what he/she thinks a goblin, ghost or witch might look like.

 Then have them tell you a story about this character.
- 14. Turn on some music, and do the Monster Mash. Make up the steps as you go along.
- 15. After reading several books in the Monster Tales unit, choose two books to compare. Ask your child to retell each story. Then ask him/her which story they liked best and why.
