Parent Conversations and Activities

Humor

- 1. Talk about what the words "real" and "make believe" mean. Then give your children several statements and have them tell you if they are real or make believe.
 - Pigs can fly
 - Dogs can fly airplanes
 - Cats can talk
 - Children go to school
 - Fish can swim
 - Elephants have cars
- 2. After reading a book from the humor unit, act out the funniest part of the book.
- 3. Take a trip to the library and read some other humorous stories.
- 4. Make character puppets from a pair of socks. They don't have to match.

 Ask your child to act out the funniest part of the story he/she read.
- Help your child learn a knock knock joke to share with his/her friends or family.
- 6. Ask your child to retell a funny story. Ask your child to start at the beginning. Then ask what happened next etc
- 7. Give your child a funny note. Then have them dictate one to you.
- 8. After reading a book to your child, ask him/her to change the ending.
- 9. Tell your child a funny story from your childhood. Then ask him/her about something that has happened to them.
- 10. Together watch a child appropriate humorous television program.

 Afterwards ask him/her what was the funniest part of the show.
- 11. Ask your child to make up a funny story and draw a picture of the funniest part or act it out.

- 12. Play" Simon Says" with your child. Don't forget the silly directions such as peepy steps and umbrella steps.
- 13. Teach your child a tongue twister like Peter Piper Picked a Peck of Pickled Peppers or make up one of your own.
- 14. After you read a story from the Humor unit to your child, ask him/her to make up his/her own funny story and act it out.
